

ALTHOUGH SOMETIMES COMPARED to Beverly Hills' Rodeo Drive or New York's Fifth Avenue, Boston's Newbury Street has a style of its own. "Indeed, it is the city's ritziest promenade," says Panamai Manadee, owner of Bliss Home, "but it is also an eclectic student hang[out]." In a span of just eight blocks,

you can stroll from uptown to downtown, with a mix of elegance, style, glamour, excitement, adventure, funk and eccentricity sandwiched in between. "The feeling changes with each block," Manadee says.

Beginning across from the **Public Garden**, at genteel Arlington Street, Newbury Street's world of international fashion, fine dining and worldly art unfolds. It is at this end of the street that well-heeled Bostonians outfit those fashionable feet and find the rest of their wardrobes. Upscale shops, such as Burberry, Cartier, **Giorgio Armani** and Versace can be found here, all a stone's throw from the newly renovated and resplendent Ritz-Carlton.

As you make your way up Newbury Street, note that the Back Bay is the only area in Boston with a logical, alphabetical street pattern. (After Arlington, Newbury Street crosses Berkeley, Clarendon, Dartmouth, Exeter, Fairfield, Gloucester and Hereford streets.) While the earliest buildings on Newbury were built in the mid- to late 1800s, they were all, at that time, residential. The first retail shop opened in 1905. Today, the

street is home to more than 150 enchanting shops. more than 40 restaurants, 40 art galleries and, believe it or not, 100 salons.

With so many places beckoning, why not enhance your Newbury Street stroll with a facial, massage, man-

icure or pedicure. For all that, **Belia**Santé is one of the hest. After being pampered, check out the alluring boutiques. Setting up your own spa at home requires only a stop at Waterworks. With everything from sweet French soaps and baby-soft towels to gleaming shower fixtures and countless tile styles, you may want to live in your bathroom. Are you more apt to be found beside the stove? Then check out **Kitchen Arts**, stocked with

all the tools required to make you the next Julia Child.

At Bliss Home, RIGHT, you can find everything to set your table in snazzy style—or peruse their collection of ultrachic Paola Lenti furniture. To be sure you return home smelling just right, pop into Diptyque, the only freestanding boutique from the Parisian parfumerle.


Smelling good is one thing, but
you might as well look good, too. When it comes to
dressing up, the choice of shops is almost endless, but
Louis Boston—technically on Berkeley Street but
perched expansively at the corner of Newbury—offers
one of the best shopping experiences in Boston for
men and women. It isn't cheap, but they do have some
amazing sales, including one in January that should not
be missed. (Take notice of the building housing Louis,
built in the French Academic style—it was Boston's former New England Museum of Natural History.) If it's a
party dress you need, head to Serenella. For sophisticated suits or eveningwear, step into Akris, BELOW.

If you're shopped out, Newbury Street has much more to offer. Emmanuel Church, the first building erected on Newbury, located between Arlington and

Berkeley streets, holds regular Sunday liturgies featuring Bach's cantata. Emmanuel's neighbor, the Church of the Covenant, is adorned with Tiftany windows. Inside, you can admire a spectacular Tiffany glass lantern.

As you stroll, you certainly will not be able to miss the four-story **mural painting** near the corner of Dartmouth Street. It may look like just a fancy backdrop to a parking lot, but look a little closer. Included in this mural are





more than 60 famous and not-so-famous Bostonians, such as John Adams, Gilded-Age art collector Isabella Stewart Gardner, King C. Gillette (inventor of the safety razor) and computer mogul An Wang.

This splendid street also is home to the largest number of art galleries in a single location anywhere in the region. The **Barbara Krakow Gallery** and **Gallery NAGA** are two standouts.

Unfortunately, you won't find the Parisian-like outdoor cafes open during the colder months, but there are certainly terrific indoor dining options on this strip. Red Sox players can be found downing veal chop and crab legs at **Ciao bella**. For traditional Indian dishes cooked in a tandoor oven, try **Kashmir**. Vietnamese soups, as well as delicious meat or vegetarian dishes, are served at **Pho Pasteur**. If you want to take in the scene while

you grab a bite, **Sonsie** and **Stephanie's on Newbury**, LEFT, are clear favorites.

As you continue along Newbury Street, you will notice the change from extravagant to more affordable stores such as the Gap and Niketown. This trend

continues as you head west, where Boston's college students frequent the shops that cater to the younger set. **Newbury Comics**, where you can find CDs, DVDs, vinyl, T-shirts, action figures and comics, is a favorite.

Newbury Street truly has something for everyone. Back Bay Bicycles is for the athlete, with a super staff that performs one of the quickest tube changes in town. Avenue Victor Hugo Bookshop is home to 150,000 books and 250,000 magazines. The Closet is packed full of secondhand clothing at drastically reduced prices. And Belle de Jour is a European-style lingerie boutique. We could go on and on—but check it out for yourself, and we are sure you'll find the place just for you.
